When asked why they do not feel safe trav eling to and from school, many responses involved contact with strange people and erra

tic behavior, often on the bus and/or Max.

x Students also cited other reasons related to thei r neighborhood or TriMet stop feeling unsafe, ople follow them off the bus/Max. Notably, a very specific fear especially at nighttime, or that pe involved stories of attempted abduction of themselves or friends.
